Risk Assessment for	

Hazard – Young Person at Work

The Health & Safety (Young Persons) Regulations 1997 place extra duties on Employers to ensure that young persons are protected in the workplace.

Possible Injuries – range of hazards face all colleagues during work – manual handling, repetitive work injuries, slips, trips & falls – the possibility of such an injury occurring with a young person increases due to their inexperience and immaturity

Who might be affected – young persons at work, also those around them who may be affected by the young person's actions. In particular, regarding fire safety, as a young person is not authorised to use any equipment or act as Fire Marshal / Warden.

Controls in place -

- Young persons only allowed to work restricted hours
- Young persons not allowed to engage in strenuous manual handling should not be involved in movement of full or heavy or large items
- No involvement in tasks that require special training
- No involvement in tasks that involve the use of dangerous machinery
- No involvement in cash operations
- Not authorised to act as Fire Marshal / Warden
- Not authorised to use any fire fighting equipment.
- Society and Branch induction to give young person greater knowledge of working environment
- Experienced "Minder" will be assigned to young person who will help them in their tasks and give guidance.
- Young persons given extra training compared to adults due to lack of experience
- Other colleagues informed of restrictions on work activities of young persons
- No imposed work rate given for tasks

Site specific controls as identified by manager –		
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Environmental Factors – unlikely to affect tasks but where environmental factors do affect work activities then specific guidance will be given to Young Person

Information & Training – All colleagues given Society & Branch induction.

Specific training given for each work activity that individual is involved in. Branch specific information available for manual handling and slips, trips & falls

Additional controls required – ongoing monitoring by Site Management

Monitor & Review – Assessment to be reviewed after an initial period of 3 months and thereafter annually. Also where activity changes substantially or following any accidents that may occur.

Comments - Residual risk considered to be low.
